BeeD: even though we know each other...

BeeD: just for the records

VanceS: ok

JeanMC: Jean Michel, in Bucaramanga, Colombia

DafneG: Dafne from Venezuela in Spain, ESP teacher

VanceS: I'm Vance, presenting tonight on Virtual Resource Centers, all the way from

Abu Dhabi

BeeD: Barbara Dieu teaches English at the Lycee Pasteur, a Franco-Brazilian school in Sao Paulo, Brazil and is also responsible for the Time Classroom Twinning activity in Time project

BeeD: Buth...Maria?

VanceS: Buth teaches English at Kuwait University JenniferK1: Greetings from Minot, North Dakota, USA

Buthaina A: I'm Buthaina, an EFL from Kuwait, Kuwait University

VanceS: Maria is from Spain, Cadiz?

DafneG: Cordoba

MariaJ: I am from Cordoba

MariaJ: Spain

JeanMC: only 2 Europeans! **AlainKr** joined the room.

VanceS: and Alain, welcome, time for one more introduction

MariaJ: but I collaborate in a project with the University of Cadiz, also Spain

AlainKr: Good evening all

BeeD: Welcome Alain! We are introducing ourselves

BeeD: My son is traveling to Cadiz in two weeks...he will be doing a project at the university

DavidEL joined the room.

AlainKr: OK, I teach English to 15-18 year olds in France

BeeD: Welcome David...

VanceS: I'll pop in the URL for tonight while we are waiting for David to introduce

himself

VanceS: http://www.mli.ac.ae/vlrc/t2t2003.htm

DafneG: hi David

DavidEL: Hello. VanceS: welcome

DavidEL: I teach computer science online to secondary students. **VanceS**: and I guess I'll start in on why I created this presentation

BeeD: Wow Vance...this looks very complete!

VanceS: well, nothing is complete, which is why I was hoping you might help me with it VanceS: At one time I had laid out a plan for a Resource Center that didn't get built for years

VanceS: so in some frustration and also because I wanted there to be a portal for it, I started this VLRC project

BeeD: Who would this be aimed at, Vance?

VanceS: the page at mli.ac.ae is on the MLI server

VanceS: and there is a java mockup of what I conceived the LRC to be like

VanceS: so just to steer you about the site, I gave it as a presentation where there was no internet connection

DavidEL: Although the Java applet doesn't seem to be working.

VanceS: so there are 'presentation links' which are screen shots of what I showed everyone

VanceS: the java applet is just a gimmick, a panoramic shot of the virtual LRC I mocked up, not important

AlainKr: Applet works fine in Orleans

DavidEL: ok

BeeD: Who was the presentation for?

VanceS: actually it's not working on my computer either, must be a java setting in the browser

VanceS: It was aimed at a live audience and was also to show colleagues what resources could be made available at our outreach sites

VanceS: I conceived the LRC to be based in Abu Dhabi but reachable via the Internet **ButhainaA**: Ok, I understand, now, Vance. I wondered about the Screen shots and why you showed them instead of the sites.

JenniferK1: I looked at the site yesterday and found your compilation of research links very valuable. Are we ready to start the discussion?

VanceS: yes, the shots are there as a record really but the interesting links are under ONLINE LINKS where you can go explore

VanceS: yes, I certainly am, and what I am hoping to get out of this discussion is about 100 new leads

VanceS: or 50 or even 3 would be great

AlainKr: Stop haggling, will you

VanceS: what do you think of the concept? Do you have any experience with this sort of site?

VanceS: for you, Alain, two and a half

JenniferK1: I work with k-6 grade teachers and part of my job is to find links that can be integrated into their curriculum

AlainKr: I had a quick glance, I'm not sure I understand what makes it new...

AlainKr: Ta!

JenniferK1: I saw the site as a research compilation

VanceS: well it's not meant to be new so much as useful

BeeD: I have my own website with suggestions for teachers and students...can show you the site map if you wish

VanceS: to gather a number of links into a place where visitors to a learning center or center site might find what they are looking for

AlainKr: What I meant was I didn't have enough time to explore all the possibilities.

AlainKr: OK JenniferK1:

DafneG: I agree with Buth

BeeD: You can have a look at this spider web

BeeD: Welcome Carlos **DafneG**: hi Carlos

AlainKr: Wow, Bee, pretty impressive too..

VanceS: under communities I link to another page where my faves are listed http://www.geocities.com/vance stevens/collabor.htm

DafneG: I love that mind map

ButhainaA: Actually, I have already modified some sessions for next semester, adding links and activities from your LCR, Vance.

ButhainaA: I was so happy, I found many things I needed and was trying to find long time ago.

VanceS: interesting web, is that Bee or Spider ...?

BeeD: Yes..having all the links at hand is extremely useful...I collect them and update them regularly

DafneG: oh, you have WiA under professional development, now I see

VanceS: Ah that's where it is

ButhainaA: Bee, I'll have to open another window, a bit confused as I have many windows opened already.

JenniferK1: How would you suggest introducing this to students at an elementary level **VanceS**: now I would add learning times and real English online to my prof dev page

DafneG: right

DafneG: I think that under e-learning you can find material for students, Jennifer

VanceS: My site is directed at adult learners but as they are ESL at varying levels sites for young learners can be appropriate

VanceS: do any of you use such sites?

BeeD: I thought your site was basically directed at ESL/EFL teachers...

VanceS: or do you have a library that you frequent online?

VanceS: yes Bee, I've been trying to get stuff for learners in there but perhaps couched in sites where teachers can direct them to it

DavidEL: I use http://www.questia.com but it is a paid service.

VanceS: how does that work?

DavidEL: There is also the Internet Public Library.

ButhainaA: Wow, the site map is amazing, Bee.

BeeD: I have special libraries for each class at school...

JenniferK1: where is the site map you are referring to?

DafneG: I have a page where I compiled pages where students and teachers can find exercises http://www.geocities.com/dygonza/usb/usb-id110.html It was created for a remedial course

BeeD: it is where they get the links appropriate for what they are doing...

DafneG: sorry I interrupted you, Bee

BeeD: it's all right

VanceS: Internet Public Library http://www.ipl.org/

JenniferK1: Wow, nice job

BeeD: From the school page of the English Department, students can go to their classes or to the activities we engage in during the year

JenniferK1: Not sure if this will work but it is full of online references. Can I paste a LOT of info into this?

BeeD: so under activities for instance...you can find Phil's Viva project...a series of forums where students debate several issues and topics

BJ: Jennifer, if the text you're copying has returns....that's what will happen

VanceS: well these will give me more leads

BeeD: Thanks for all this Jennifer....but let's listen to what Vance has to say

VanceS: I don't have so much to say as to discuss with you varying approaches to the problem of accessing resources online

DafneG: the problem is to have them handy

VanceS: do you have LRC's in your own institutes? and do they have portal pages? **BeeD**: I usually make my students use the English dept all the time...whatever I want them to do I put it on a page and place it there

BeeD: Our school does not have a portal...so this is the way I found to make them access the net

VanceS: yes it seems you have confronted this problem Bee and I like your mindmap approach

DavidEL: I assist teachers in moving from traditional face-to-face teaching and learning to distributed environments. I have created a number of open access pages for collaborative development. http://learning.sd41.bc.ca/teacher

DavidEL: http://togetherapart.com/ProD.htm

DavidEL: Is that the type of resources you are referring to Vance?

BeeD: This is so nice David

VanceS: I've cataloged a lot of sites as well though haven't updated lately

DavidEL: These are just collections of online resources for teachers to share.

VanceS: http://www.geocities.com/vance_stevens/lnxmainp.htm

VanceS: needless to say a lot of teachers have a lot of web sites up, a lot of them useful VanceS: my own approach is to organize it my way, so I can make sense of the world around me

VanceS: others have similarly idiosyncratic approaches

VanceS: the trick is to widen your sphere and anticipate the next person over, or maybe someone a few doors down

BeeD: Yes...this is how I started my pages...organizing my links..and then classifying them according to the public

DafneG: the WiA portal is a resource center, too

VanceS: eventually you find that others find it useful, and then you start developing for a wider audience

VanceS: in a way I'm looking for sites that have gone way beyond that, that have some backing and a staff

AlainKr left the room (signed off).

VanceS: I put a variety of those under "Other Virtual Resource Portals"

VanceS: I meant here to place a sampling ranging from free to commercial

BeeD: You have the BBC search English site, which is excellent

VanceS: the HK site is quite good http://vlc.polyu.edu.hk/

BeeD: http://searchenglish.britishcouncil.org

VanceS: any more in this category?

BeeD: http://www.eun.org
VanceS: looks interesting

BeeD: http://www.pbs.org/teachersource/

JeanMC: lot of time to review all these sites!...but it sounds interesting

BeeD: http://www.rockhall.com/programs/plans.asp

BeeD: http://www.keynews.org/ **BeeD**: and zillions of others...lol

ButhainaA: I use the HK site, Vance, but it's not free anymore.

VanceS: it's not??

ButhainaA: some links I used have changed too.

VanceS: maybe parts of it **ButhainaA**: yes, the reading. **ButhainaA**: reading, that is.

VanceS: this music site reminds me of Michael Coghlan's pages, only he writes his own

music

DavidEL: I don't know if this would be helpful but it's an online library with books. It's a wonderful resource that would be relevant to ESL and elementary learners: http://www.icdlbooks.org/library_pc.html

BeeD: A wonderful Australian site for kids...http://www.abc.net.au/talkitup/

VanceS: I have the virtual bookshelf section. Of course, books are essential to an online library

DavidEL: here's a site with talking / audio books: http://wiredforbooks.org/ **VanceS**: Project Guttenberg is the most amazing effort, been going for years

VanceS: Michael's site with songs and lessons: http://users.chariot.net.au/~michaelc/

VanceS: If you find an online site, or look for one, for yourself or for your students, what do you hope you'll find there?

BeeD: content

VanceS: An LRC site I mean BeeD: organized content

JeanMC: information, exercises, links

VanceS: that's a pretty broad questions, eliciting broad answers, my fault

VanceS: you go for so many reasons

VanceS: I like museums that show the art for example

VanceS: ok, another slant on the same question, what categories of organization have I left out?

BJ: Something that might be good to use for ESL activities would be

BJ: you can build your own museum collection and add descriptive text

VanceS: THAT's interesting

ButhainaA: Yes, indeed, quite interesting, BJ.

BeeD: and one for life long learning...which I am sure many adult learners may appreciate as it covers different areas http://204.42.170.21/undp/

BJ: there are several transcripts archived on the tutorials that Kevan Nitzberg has done in Tapped In

VanceS: on what topic?

VanceS: I think I've got about 98 leads already ... maybe two more so I can reach my goal?

BJ: virtual field trips?

VanceS: and how things work (if I can think of the url) **BeeD**: Well, Vance...I guess you have your 100 links now...

BeeD: and we are at the end of our forum

VanceS: that's it
