VictorE: **SarathS**: Thank you for the resource, I will look it up later.

MargaretD: it would be interesting

SarathS: I just looked the page http://www.ldrc.ca/ gives details of the online course

MargaretD: most Polish have not learned English in school

SarathS: Also gives details about 'Atutor', a free online course designing software

Americans.

MargaretD: used to be Russian MargaretD: sometimes German

SarathS: Yes, German makes more sense

MargaretD: Russian does, too

SarathS: Yes, true

MargaretD: but now they have joined the EU they need English

PennyRa: Ok- the title of this session was World Friendship Through Language Learning - so exactly what do all of you discuss in here? Or do you have some interesting websites?

RobinK: It seems like people from other countries learn to speak English easily as compared to us Americans learning their languages

MargaretD: we have essentially free discussions

RobinK: Houston is a very international city but especially the kids learn English very quickly just going to school

MargaretD: this is true Robin...many countries now start in Kindergarten

VictorE: Sarath or Margaret, do you feel that English is slowly becoming a universal language?

MargaretD: more second language speakers than native

PennyRa: Any suggestions for teaching English to Hispanic and other foreign students? A good website for some simple English stories that it will also read to students in English is www.starfall.com. They also gladly send free materials.

MargaretD: there are a lot of free sites for material **MargaretD**: www.onestopenglish.com for example

RobinK: I have a friend that teaches math to ESL (English as second Language) classes in high school. She has told me she goes to library for translation dictionaries a lot.

MargaretD: the BBC has some interesting things

SarathS: BBC has some good multi media materials, too

MargaretD: the best is to get them to stop translating as soon as possible

RobinK: I am so surprised at all the information that is available on line..... I had no idea until I started back to college!!!!

MargaretD: yes, a real gem!

MargaretD: there is a magazine here in Germany called Spotlight and they have a wonderful site now

MargaretD: also for their Business magazine. too

PennyRa: The starfall website will send booklets on a 1st grade level that are in color for free. I usually send for a whole class set.

SarathS: Yes, unbelievable the resources on the web

PennyRa: <u>WWW.Educationworld.com</u> is great too-it has free worksheets that you can print off.

MargaretD: especially nice is you don't have to feel alone

MargaretD: like here at TI you will meet other educators

SarathS: there's something I would like to ask about how one use the web, if you please **RobinK**: do you feel the web has helped teachers add more variety and get help from other knowledgeable educators?

SarathS: Do you use different search engines/techniques for different types of resources

MargaretD: I think so

SarathS: The web really has helped teachers

SarathS: Especially so in remote areas of the world

RobinK: I have found you get different sites if you use different search engines

SarathS: where teachers just do not have numbers and experts around

MargaretD: I belong to the listserve TESL and have access to at least 30,000 teachers worldwide for ideas

SarathS: and for those teachers in remote corners, the web brings resources that were not dreamt of earlier

MargaretD: yes you do Robin

RobinK: it really helps to bounce ideas off others and to learn from their mistakes so you don't have to make them yourself

MargaretD: I have my favorites depending on what I am looking for

SarathS: So does any have favourite search techniques?

SarathS: opps

PennyRa: I just read an article about the web redefining the concept of literacy.

SarathS: and the concepts of knowledge

MargaretD: well, I think it is mega cool to speak with teachers in Mongolia for example VictorE: MargaretD and SarathS, thanks for sharing and the chat. signing off VictorE.
