AnnieD: I teach 7th & 8th Language Arts in Northridge, California

LeoL joined the room.

MichaelH: Hi, Leo we're just introducing ourselves right now

LoraAB joined the room.

HelenK: Quesnel BJ Canada

LeoL: sorry I'm late

MichaelH: so far Katy and Derya have the geographic distance prizes

LeoL: musician/k-8 teacher New Jersey

MichaelH: no problem, Leo, we are just getting started

DeE smiles

HeatherAB: Texas, Technology

LoraAB: middle school science math and social studies teacher

KatyD: we deserve it

DeE: it is 3 am here now

MichaelH looks to see if anyone else would like to introduce themselves

DeE: yeah

MichaelH: glad you both could join us!

MichaelH: Before we start, just a couple of things...

MichaelH: first, Donelle has a lot of great resources she'll share tonight, and of course, she'll have web pages she'll share

MichaelH: but, don't stray too far too long, because you'll want to stay with the discussion

MichaelH: remember, all the links she'll share are in the transcript

MichaelH: and, don't forget

MichaelH: TeacherSource is a great resource, so if you have questions, feel free to share those too

MichaelH: but, I may need to help field them to Donelle if there's a lot of them

MichaelH: so, Donelle, whenever you are ready!

DonelleB: Thanks, Michael!

DonelleB: I thought I would focus on resources for teaching/learning about current events and public affairs.

MichaelH: sounds great!

DonelleB: Let's start with the TeacherSource home page: http://www.pbs.org/teachersource

MichaelH: reminds all they can just click on the blue link and the page should load

MichaelH: you MAY need to turn off pop up blockers, though

HeatherAB . o O (you can hold down the Ctrl key)

MichaelH checks if everyone can see the new page

MichaelH: thanks, Heather!

DonelleB: This is our portal to PBS's education resources:

DonelleB: I'll leave to y'all to browse around at your leisure to do specific searches for your subjects/grades.

DonelleB: It's pretty intuitive.

DonelleB: Everything is matched to standards.

DonelleB: There are tons of lesson plans, interactives, etc., etc. on social studies topics.

DonelleB: However, some of our best assets are not apparent . . . so I'm going to take you through some back doors.

DonelleB: Ready?

MichaelH is

PamGC: yes

HeatherAB nods

AnnieD: yes

KatyD: yes

DonelleB: Let's start with NewsHour: http://www.pbs.org/newshour/

LoraAB: yes

DeE: I guess we cannot watch tv outside US?

DonelleB: I don't understand your question.

MichaelH: I think what's being asked, Donelle is whether they can get PBS

MichaelH: Derya is from Turkey

DonelleB: Hmmmm. Probably via satellite.

DonelleB: The good news is that I'm going to show you online video.

MichaelH: maybe too, you could use some of the lessons without the related programming?

DeE: Great

DonelleB: If you scan the page, you'll see that portions of each broadcast are available as streaming audio or video.

KatyD: do we have to click in video link

DonelleB: Don't click there now.

DonelleB: I just want you to note the availability.

KatyD: ok

MichaelH: Donelle, what software would they need for the streaming video... is it just through the web browser?

DonelleB: Having these media assets online gives you such great flexibility.

DonelleB: Most of the programs that stream media use quicktime or realplayer.

MichaelH: thanks

DonelleB: Let's look at some other goodies:

AnnieD: Can you tape these streaming to a disc?

DonelleB: http://www.pbs.org/newshour/rss/media/

DonelleB: Most of the video available online is not downloadable. Sorry!

KatyD: good question

DeE: podcasting is available, I think

PamGC: It looks like real audio is available to download

DonelleB: Yes. That last URL shows you what RSS feed and other subscriptions are available. Check the range of topics!

AnnieD: ok.

DonelleB: Have any of you been using podcasts in your teaching?

MichaelH: I haven't yet, Donelle, but I know several PBS programs are using it now.

PamGC: I'm just learning about podcasting

MichaelH . o O (American Experience for one)

DonelleB: Let me show you some instructional tips:

KatyD: please

DonelleB: http://www.pbs.org/newshour/extra/

PamGC: I can always use instructional tips

DonelleB: This is the area of the NewsHour site designed for students and teachers. They just redesigned it.

PamGC: This is really neat!

DonelleB: Take a look at the featured lesson plan on the left--Using, Analyzing and Creating Podcasts.

DonelleB: Does this look like something you could use?

MichaelH . o O (can everyone find the link ok... it's on the left side of the page)

HeatherAB: Wonderful!

DeE: Yes, absolutely!

PamGC: Yes, it has lots of interesting information re: podcasting

KymberlyT: Yes Michael I found the link and opened the page. This is very interesting.

AnnieD: yes. awesome

PamGC: This will definitely help my learning curve!

MichaelH: wow, Donelle, too bad you don't get a dollar for every "awesome", "interesting", and "wonderful" tonight

DonelleB: Glad you like it. When you can spend some time on the full site, you'll see that the NewHour folks have sliced and diced their content to make it quite easy to find what fits your needs.

KatyD: fantastic

DeE smiles

KymberlyT: Great idea and avenue to help teach students to diversify their IPODS and MP3 players

DonelleB: I'll share this part of the transcript with NewsHour.

LeoL: OK Time for a stupid question... is there any difference between loading a podcast and handing a kid a cd to play on her Walkman?

HeatherAB . o O (I'd say, "not much")

LeoL: just in the data format?

DonelleB: Right. It

DonelleB: it's just an audio file.

MichaelH: maybe that the CD would have some cost, where you could simply delete the podcast once it was no longer timely to save?

LeoL: ty Heather and Donelle

LeoL: OK

DonelleB: The podcast designation is actually more about frequency of distribution rather than format.

LeoL: thanks

LeoL: I'd hang the audio file somewhere and let the kids download it onto their i-Pods?

DonelleB: Yes.

LeoL: thanks

DonelleB: Or run it through speakers in your classroom.

LeoL enters the 21st century

DonelleB: Ready for the next stop?

HeatherAB nods

PamGC: Sure

KatyD: yes

MichaelH: whenever you're ready, Donelle

DeE: sure!

LeoL: k

DonelleB: Let's go to Frontline: http://www.pbs.org/wgbh/pages/frontline/teach/

DonelleB: Frontline specializes in documentaries on global issues.

AnnieD: wow

PamGC: This has a place especially for teachers also

DonelleB: Please click on "Watch Online" on the right side of the page.

DeE: also provides some additional links

DonelleB: Click on any one of the titles to see how the programs are segmented for

streaming.

AnnieD: these you can buy

DonelleB: Perfect lengths for classroom viewing, yes?

HeatherAB: Yes!

MichaelH: I'm looking at the links for "The Dark Side"... it's extremely cool!

DonelleB: Yes, you can buy the DVDs, but there's no need if you can get someone to buy

you a projector for your classroom.

DeE: are the scripts available?

PamGC: So you can show the video on a projector as streaming video?

KatyD: very neat

DonelleB: I believe so, but I'd have to check.

DeE: yes yes

LeoL: yes you can

MichaelH: I bet you could, Donelle

DeE: just below the screen

MichaelH waves to David

HeatherAB . o O (Pam, you might want to check with your Tech person...it can eat up

bandwidth)

DeE: says transcript

PamGC: Good point, Heather

DonelleB: That can be an issue. Sigh.

PamGC: Issues are around to be dealt with, right?

MichaelH: could you save the clips to your hard drive, though?

HeatherAB: But if you let tech know ahead of time, they can probably work with it.

DonelleB: Mostly the streamed media can't be downloaded.

DonelleB: We'd have to charge for that:)

KatyD: where are the transcripts

DeE: while you are watching- just under the screen

KatyD: thanks

DeE: you can watch and scroll down to check the transcript

DeE: cool, right?

HeatherAB: very

DonelleB: It can be so difficult to help kids understand these huge issues. These programs can really help.

DonelleB: BTW, these video assets don't currently show up when you do a search on TeacherSource.

DonelleB: But they will when we relaunch at the end of the year with new search capabilities.

PamGC: So you need to go direct to the source?

DonelleB: Yes.

DonelleB: I'll show you one more. Let's go to Wide Angle.

KatyD: what do you mean?

PamGC: Good, let's go

DonelleB: http://www.pbs.org/wnet/wideangle/index.html

MichaelH: it's a series, Katy

KatyD: I see

DonelleB: This series focuses on global issues. Great stuff for geography, world cultures, current event, etc.

MichaelH: did everyone get to "Wide Angle"?

LeoL: k

AnnieD: yes

DeE: yes

LoraAB: yes

KatyD: it's ok

HeatherAB nods

PamGC: yes

DonelleB: Please click on "Global Classroom" on the top right.

KatyD: yes

PamGC: This is really great! I am SO glad I came to this meeting!

KymberlyT: got it.

DavidWe smiles

DonelleB: You'll see a HUGE lesson plan index. These you can find via TeacherSource, but, again, there is tons of video available here that I wanted you to be aware of.

MichaelH: To be honest, Pam, this was a series that I wasn't that familiar with until recently, but it has some excellent content

DonelleB: They also make is easy for you to send these pages to colleagues. Share the wealth!

KatyD: it really looks great

MichaelH: ummm... Donelle, maybe they'd like to see the lesson that goes with this week's film for Wide Angle?

DonelleB: Hang on. I want to point out another teaching strategy.

KatyD: which one?

MichaelH: sure

DonelleB: Never mind. I lost it.

DeE: this week's film for Wide Angle?

DonelleB: Michael, will you show them a lesson while I take a dive for the other thing?

MichaelH: sure, Donelle,

MichaelH: are you still on "Global Classroom"? If so, check the lesson called "The Celtic Mouse That Roared" (it is the first one in Economics)

KymberlyT: I have been looking around the lesson on Education. Very interesting.

MichaelH: I happen to know the creator of this lesson pretty well

DonelleB: Would that be you?

MichaelH: ummm, guess so

DonelleB: Bravo!

PamGC: So modest:)

AnnieD: very nice

DonelleB: I found it! Take a look:

MichaelH: This was a bit of a challenge for me, because my background isn't really economics... but this gives you an idea of how diverse the lessons can be.

DonelleB: http://www.pbs.org/wnet/wideangle/classroom/lp4.html

MichaelH: this can be used in econ, sociology, world history, world culture, current problems, etc.

DonelleB: How hard is it to get students to go really deep into issues?

KatyD: yes you are right

DonelleB: Take a look at the Academic Controversy Primer at http://www.pbs.org/wnet/wideangle/classroom/controversy.html

KymberlyT: Michael, do you think that this would be too global for middle school students?

MichaelH: not really, Kymberly, you might just need to prep them for it

LeoL: procedure is parallel to Bloom

AnnieD: awesome site to debate

MichaelH: of course, my main teaching experience is high school, but I would use this with 9th graders probably

MichaelH: and that's pretty close to middle school

LeoL: really thorough lesson Michael

LoraAB: You would be surprised what middle school students will do when standards are set high

MichaelH: thanks, Leo

PamGC: Or the subject interests or impacts them

KatyD: that is true

KymberlyT: The students that I work with are not very advanced nor global minded despite the high expectations that our team puts on them.

MichaelH: but, Kymberly, this might be a good way to motivate them.

LeoL: teach Blooms explicitly They love finding out how tests are written

DavidWe: Time to expand their horizons, Kymberly

DonelleB: Through the magic of online video!

MichaelH: last week's film (18 with a Bullet) was an excellent one that would reach to a lot of kids

DonelleB: And great teaching.

LoraAB: they will surprise you

KatyD: thanks a lot Michael

KymberlyT: I'm working on it. I'll check out the one you just recommended Michael.

DonelleB: That's my current events tour. Any questions for PBS?

PamGC: Thanks, Donelle. I really learned a lot.

MichaelH: Donelle, maybe tell them about TeacherPreviews?

LoraAB: thanks very informative

AnnieD: excellent sources. Thank you Donelle and Michael.

HeatherAB: thank you

MichaelH: we've still got about five minutes

DonelleB: TeacherPreviews is our e-newsletter. It's easy to subscribe from

TeacherSource.

DeE: teacherpreviews?

DeE: hmmm

DonelleB: It will brief you on upcoming programs and other resources.
