SusanR: I thoroughly enjoy kindergarten...quite refreshing. BJ: We're just doing introductions, Kristi. Can you introduce yourself to everyone, please? AngelaM: this site is actually one of my bookmarks. It is great to go to this page when I am unsure of how a song goes.

SusanR: If you need the lyrics to a song you should find it here...gather your youngsters around the computer and sing along

JenW: Great site

SusanR: I come back to this site frequently!

KristiHe: Some who cannot carry a tune like myself will use this site often

AngelaM: It is also useful for background music for those lyrics that are not traditional.

Such as I'm a Little Leprechaun instead of teapot.

SusanR agrees. I cannot carry a tune.

SusanR: I would suggest bookmarking it and coming back to the site later.

JenW: I never knew the Sugar Plum Fairy song had words -- very cool site

JosephineK: It's a great site to share with the teachers in Remus.

SusanR: One of our Tech Integrators shared this site with us! Ready to look at the great symphony orchestras .. and what they offer for Kids

AngelaM: Absolutely

SusanR: We will take a look at the Dallas Symphony Orchestra next...

SusanR: an outstanding music web site with links for composers, instruments, theory, sheet music and much more. ... the Teachers' Lounge provides useful information
