KarenE: Amanda.....while you're looking at the Comm Sci Action Guides, you might also like the Water resources for early elem ---- <u>http://www.fi.edu/guide/hongell/</u>

JeffC: If anyone would like to comment on the new links (aside from Franklin Institute), please feel free, then it's over to Karen. If you have any problems joining the group, send me a private chat message (double click my name in the Here tab to open a dialogue).

ElizabetS2: wonderful- thank you Karen. I actually work in the Center of Aging at our college now- it is the most perfect example you could have given me

SarahMor: I am looking for some animal adaptation sites and I do not seem to see any on the list

KarenE: Happy to help!

KarenE: Sarah, what grade level?

SarahMor: I started to look at the animal planet site

SarahMor: 1st or 2nd

KarenE: Hmmm...

KarenE: animals for early elem

KarenE: let me see....

GailH: Kitty and Hawk activities are neat, but not really about animals! KarenE: Something Froggy ---- http://www.fi.edu/fellows/fellow9/jun99/index.html ---might be good, but a bit more useful for cross-curricular than strictly for science KarenE: Hold on for another link SarahMor: great I will check it out SarahMor: thank you Karen GailH: Karen, who writes the materials you are showing? KarenE: ummm....several of the sites I've showed are developed by in-service teachers DavidWe: Philadelphia folks, Karen? KarenE: The Guides and Pieces of Science are developed by the Online Museum Educators who are located all across the country **DavidWe** . o O (or throughout the SLN network?) **KarenE**: there are even some in the UK DavidWe: cool! **IhorC**: I'm going to take off too and come back when I'm operating on all cylinders KarenE: Dave, not SLN-related, no DavidWe nods **IhorC**: Good night GailH waves to Ihor. DavidWe waves bye to Ihor **KarenE**: These are more recent efforts than the SLN work **KarenE**: BUT, the www.sln.org site does have some great science education resources **IhorC** left the room (signed off). KarenE: now that you remind me of that GailH: One of the popular Franklin Institute pages that I show teachers is http://www.keystone.fi.edu/matrix1.shtml (but I remind them to scroll down) and then they are quite excited with all they see. SarahMor: the something froggy site is great KarenE: Yes, anyone who is interested in K-8 inquiry science will want to know about the Matrix KarenE: http://www.keystone.fi.edu/matrix1.shtml SarahMor: it really talks about all the adaptations that frogs have KarenE: Thanks, Sarah SarahMor: yes SarahMor: my adaptations lesson needs to be inquiry, guided, and challenge activities **DavidWe** thinks frogs are pretty cool in their diversity KarenE: Elizabeth....this site is a little bit out-of-date, so we don't talk about it much, but it has some ideas that you might find useful....it's called BioPoint KarenE: http://www.fi.edu/ga97/biology/biopoint1.html KarenE: It follows one high school bio student through her school year **ElizabetS2**: oh neat- thanks KarenE: Meanwhile, Elizabeth, we have our Human Brain exhibit ----KarenE: www.fi.edu/brain GailH: The Froggy Page <u>http://www.frogsonice.com/froggy/</u> was one of the first web sites for teachers that took off. It is 10 years old now--talk about dinosaurs. **KarenE**: which is advanced

KarenE: but could be used by HS teachers SusanR joined the room. SusanR waves GailH waves to Susan. SusanR: Hi Gail. Sorry I am late. GailH: Karen is showing resources from the Franklin Institute. KarenE: When you mentioned Animals, Sarah...you reminded me of Rockhounds (because it has a hound-dog)which is GREAT for early elem earth science..... it's here http://www.fi.edu/fellows/fellow1/oct98/index.html **SusanR**: thanks KarenE: I know you didn't ask for earth science.....but just in case anyone is interested in earth science for early elem KarenE: Rock Hounds is VERY popular ElizabetS2: These are all terrific sites, thank you. I actually wish I had known about them when I was in school! But I am so glad you are expanding my horizons now. KarenE: You're welcome! GailH: Karen, last year the Franklin Institute did the celebration of 100 years of flight --Wright Brothers. The resources you linked to then were wonderful. The science at elementary level were wonderful! KarenE: Thanks, Gail! KarenE: We have TONS of stuff related to the Wright Brothers KarenE: it's at www.fi.edu/wright DavidWe thinks the Franklin Institute is a GREAT place KarenE: Thanks, Dave! GailH knows it is. **DavidWe**. o O (and there is a new HEART!) KarenE: Well, it's the same heart KarenE: but improved **KarenE**: and surrounded by a great new bioscience exhibit **DavidWe** smiles GailH: Real or virtual or oth? **DavidWe** grins KarenE: Real **KarenE**: giant, walkthrough heart **DavidWe**: Well, definitely the big REAL one **DavidWe** nods **KarenE**: it's a Philadelphia landmark KarenE: Did you walk thru, Gail, when you visited? GailH: You also had a virtual one years ago too! KarenE: Still do KarenE: www.fi.edu/biosci GailH: Yes, of course. I walked (and ran!) through it. KarenE: it's our most visited resource at The Franklin Institute Online **GailH**. o O (child at heart !!) DavidWe 's Mom got hold of a cow's heart so he could bring it in to science class in 7th grade

KarenE: I hadn't mentioned it (yet) because it's not specifically designed for classroom use, though KarenE: Still we have plenty of teachers who make use of it **KarenE**: Anyone who will be at NECC in June should be sure to visit the Heart KarenE: It's a rite of passage in Philadelphia **DavidWe** will be at NECC ElizabetS2: 0000h- the pictures of the preserved heart are terrific! KarenE: Yes! **SusanR**. o O (wonders where NECC is next year) KarenE: Philadelphia KarenE: The Franklin Institute will host some events DavidWe: We can put you up somewhere, Sue, if you want to come KarenE: Plus, all NECC badgeholders can visit the Museum for free throughout the convention **DavidWe** is proud to be a FI member, most of the time KarenE: proud most of the time? **DavidWe** . o O (member MOST of the time...) KarenE: or, member most of the time? KarenE grins **DavidWe** smiles **BJ** thinks there should be a TI meeting at NECC DavidWe votes yes twice GailH triple votes for it. **DavidWe** worries about the vote counting as we seem to be stuffing the ballot box GailH: Karen, a question about the FI's web site? KarenE checks her keyboard for chads KarenE: yes, Gail? **DavidWe**.oO(LOL) GailH: Is there a site map or big picture place that will help get for great part to great part? **KarenE**: no, but our search engine is excellent KarenE: I do have a one-page "guide" **KarenE**: that I give to teachers **GailH**: virtually give? KarenE: It's a pdf http://www.fi.edu/teachers/tfionline guide.pdf KarenE: it gives a "front door" orientation GailH: Thanks! KarenE: but, it is a problem.....behind that front door is TONS of great stuff KarenE: but it's hard to know what's there. **DavidWe** still wants to sleep over under the big statue of Benjamin Franklin KarenE: Although, as I mentioned, if you enter a search term, you get a fast, quality return GailH: I found (stumbled into) http://www.fi.edu/math/ and really loved the open-ended math problems the other day. I don't think I had ever been there before. **DavidWe** looks at that web page GailH: But, if you don't know about it, you don't think to search for it.

KarenE: Yes, our online math collection is good

KarenE: it was developed by in-service math teachers

DavidWe nods

DavidWe: Great

KarenE: we need our own mini-ENC database

KarenE: someday

GailH: Is anything new (or coming out soon)?

DavidWe . o O (Well, Gail will get it done...most likely)

SusanR: I can really use the schoolyard geometry

KarenE: Coming soon is some archival stuff related to famous scientists in history

KarenE: including Elmer Sperry, William Burroughs, William Jennings, and C. Francis Jenkins

KarenE: we have amazing primary sources from their science....and we're developing **KarenE**: online presentations that

KarenE: also offer K-12 classroom connections

KarenE: PLUS, the other brand new thing we have is Internet2

KarenE: we're beginning to develop interactive programming for schools that have Internet2 connections

GailH: David said you could use a mini-ENC database.

GailH: If I may show a long url (and not scare you) I can show you one now.
