MaryBethC: I haven't either.

BJ: I'm looking for it...give me a sec

DarlaGst10: Does anybody have any info about Nancy **SusanR**: Bj Nancy has been featured On Education World

BJ: Did you all read your November Tapped In newsletter?

GeneKe: nope

BJ . o O (Nancy is quite a celebrity!)

GeneKe: didn't get it

BJ: http://tappedin.org/tappedin/web/newsletter/

GeneKe: k

BJ: everyone getting the urls?

ShannanM: I linked onto the cyberbully site

ShannanM: Wow.... I didn't realize high school kids were doing that! **MaryBethC**: I did too. I didn't know that was going on! That's horrible!

ShannanM: That is bad

SusanR: Please follow up with the Education World feature on Nancy Willard as well

ShannanM: I didn't get the newsletter either.... let me check it out

SusanR: Keeping Kids Safe http://www.education-world.com/a tech/tech119.shtml

JessicaEd: that stuff is horrible!! poor kids SusanR: Both sites are worth bookmarking!

BJ: Nancy has been very active in Washington and she also is working with ASCD on some projects

BJ . o O (<u>www.ascd.org</u>)

GeneKe: it's not much different than when we were kids...merely a different medium

KatieBo: yeah

SusanR: There is so much temptation out there!

BJ: Gene, it's different in that the kids can hide behind the anonymity of the web

GeneKe: if you're smart you can bully more covertly **GeneKe**: but there are more trails through technology

JavierSa: I think that is the issue. anonymity expose anyone but the perpetrator. **MaryBethC**: unfortunately, kids are becoming more creative with our technological advances

TrishaN: It's scary stuff... And so many kids don't even know what's happening until its too late...

GeneKe: True

DarlaGst10: kids today usually know more about computers/internet than their parents **GeneKe**: but once it's egregious, malicious, libelous, slanderous, etcetera, the law can get involved

SusanR: Luckily some students approach their teachers or/and another adult before it gets out of control

JavierSa: is there any law to prevent / correct this?

JessicaEd: those kids know more about computers than me!!

GeneKe: freedom of speech is a constitutional right

GeneKe: however there are limits

GeneKe: defamation is a sueable infraction

SusanR: You might want to note the definition of cyberbullying here and what it includes ...

SusanR: a Canadian site ... http://www.cyberbullying.ca/

TrishaN: But at what point is any of this considered more than teasing and actually defamation? Does this apply to minors as well or just those over 18?

SusanR: Read Bill's introductory quote

GeneKe: That's a matter for the court to decide **ShannanM**: I've looked at the education world site

SusanR: It's a good start, Shannan **SusanR**: and introduces you to Nancy

SusanR: Nancy Willard, that is

GeneKe: BJ---are you facilitating tonite, or biding time for someone else

JavierSa: I think it is our responsibility to teach children about respect... Not only online, but in every context. When they lack respect, they will abuse any resource.

DarlaGst10: does anybody know any court cases w/ cyberbullying

JessicaEd: good point Javier

ShannanM: I thought Nancy was going to be with us tonight?

SusanR: court case, Darla

SusanR: 2001..but there must be more

JessicaEd: the children's internet protection act is just about teaching students to make right choices on the internet

MaryBethC: I'm sure new laws are now being developed because of the newity of the internet, etc...

SusanR: We are still waiting for Nancy. Perhaps she is experiencing some technical difficulties

JavierSa: wow.. that article is scary... cyberbullying can be the precursor of physical violence.

TrishaN: I could believe that. In a way, it is a form of violence that students can use then they are afraid to physically bully someone but still want to intimidate them...

SusanR: INCREASING numbers of children are falling victim to cyber bullies, who have adopted the internet as their preferred weapon of humiliation and abuse.

SusanR: Here's a current article out of the UK on cyberbullying

JessicaEd: i'm glad i'm not in middle or high school right now, i can't imagine dealing with that embarrassment - people can be so cruel!!

SusanR waits for it to load

ShannanM: That article is pretty shocking

TrishaN: I agree

SusanR: and now most young people have cell phones

DarlaGst10: I agree the article makes me think about how people can be so mean

JavierSa: I am with you Jessica!

MaryBethC: Shannan, which article did you read?

ShannanM: the Salon case

JavierSa: ok, the problem is there, but what can we do to fix the problem? **SusanR**: Here's the salon article, MaryBeth ..and for anyone who missed it ... http://archive.salon.com/mwt/feature/2001/07/03/cyber_bullies/print.html

MaryBethC: could someone tell me on that article's web address if those are zeros? I'm having trouble pulling it up

BJ: try this, Javier: http://responsiblenetizen.org/

DarlaGst10: well I take it Nancy is not attending the discussion 2night

JavierSa: thanks!

JessicaEd: wow there are even activities on that website for safe internet instruction **BJ**: Doesn't look like she'll make it, Darla. But Sue and I are giving you much of the information she would have given you....

MaryBethC: Thanks Susan

TrishaN: Does anyone have other articles on cyberbullying and what we can do about it?

JessicaEd: bj-you have been very helpful

BJ: you can also check out the archived transcripts of her sessions at www.tappedin.org/transcripts

DarlaGst10: thank you- BJ & Sue

ShannanM: I will check out the responsible article

BJ: thanks, Jessica.

JavierSa: yes, very helpful. It seems like you know some stuff about this. Have you any experience with cyberbullying?

BJ: I did email Nancy and didn't hear from her, so I'm assuming she's got tech problems or a personal emergency

BJ: I've attended conferences that had featured speakers on the topic

BJ . o O (more on Bullying in general)

BJ: bullying got a lot of press after Columbine

MaryBethC: After reading this article, it makes me think of the tragedy that happened at Columbine High School in Colorado. I believe those two boys had a website in which they used it to threaten other students

MaryBethC: We were thinking on the same lines, BJ

BJ: then everything settled down...and counselors at columbine were actually saying that they were relieved to see bullying returning to the school because it was a sign of back to normal!

BJ . o O (pretty scary when you think of it)

ShannanM: that is a great article for students

JessicaEd: wow

JavierSa: what! This is crazy!

SusanR: BJ, in another article Nancy stated that technology can also affect a young person's ethical behaviour

SusanR: because it doesn't provide tangible feedback about the consequences of actions on others.

ShannanM: the responsible citizen site

SusanR: It's from the media awareness site

BJ nods to Sue. I think that is where schools are missing a serious opportunity by filtering out offensive sites

BJ: by doing that (even if it's ineffective), they are not giving students the responsibility of making good choices

BJ: and being accountable for their decisions

JavierSa: I think that is only making the bullying more difficult. However, the social problem will be there anyway.

ShannanM: I thought schools had software that filtered the internet for students

JavierSa: I think education is more than curriculum.. it is civics and responsibility.

MaryBethC: good point, Javier

JessicaEd: yes Javier

ShannanM: Not all students can be trusted to make the right decisions so we have to make them for them

TrishaN: thank you... technical issues : /

BJ: Shannan, we have to make decisions because students can't be trusted?

BJ: yikes...how do we create trustworthy citizens?

ShannanM: when it comes to a decision such as filtering offensive web sites

JavierSa: we must teach responsibility, morals and ethics!

SusanR: btw, Javier, are you aware of the media awareness network as a teaching tool for cyberbullying

TrishaN: I hate to sound pessimistic-- but what a job that would be!

ShannanM: no I don't think we should just trust that the students will not visit web sites that aren't appropriate

JavierSa: no, I am not... I would like to know more...

JavierSa: but it is our mission!
ShannanM: yes we must teach them

SusanR: Take a look at this site ..it may answer some of those nagging questions....

JessicaEd: I think we should filter the internet at school

BJ: Our time is almost over, everyone

JavierSa: yes, we should do that, we need to raise parent's awareness and teach respect at school.

MaryBethC: This is just a classroom example, but I have witnessed teachers not allowing students to research the internet in their classrooms because of the amount of monitoring it takes from the teacher
