PamB: Well, maybe we should start...

PamB: let's first introduce ourselves

LoriSi: Lori, Round Rock TX, graduate student in instructional tech

MaryFT: I'm Mary Thompson, a lecturer at University of Houston. I teach technology integration courses for preservice teachers

PamB: I'm a library/technology consultant from New York. I work with school districts and universities around the country.

MarthaJ: I am a technology resource teacher in Alexandria, VA

PamB: Welcome every one. Tonight we are going to look at a web tool called Camtasia...

PamB: Camtasia records and captures your desktop and automatically creates online demos and software simulations

PamB: Mary has been using it and has created a demo of Tapped In that she is going to share with us...

JasonDe joined the room.

PamB: Mary take it away!

MaryFT: If you are in room view, you can see the example that Bj has posted called Demo of TI using Camtasia

MaryFT: You can click on that but I have also prepared a page with other examples: http://www.coe.uh.edu/courses/cuin3113/camtasia.htm

JasonDe: how do you get to room view?

MaryFT: I'd like everyone to take a look at a least one example so that you can see what a Camtasia video looks like

MaryFT: Jason, there should be button called Room View at the top of your screen

MarthaJ: Mary, I really like that video. Do you use it in a F2F class or is it a online class?

LoriSi: I think I might have heard of snag it in a class I recently took for the tech program

LoriSi: never used it though

MaryFT: The TI example is one that I use with an online class

JasonDe: I did find room view but it does not change the look

MaryFT: The other videos are used in a hybrid f2f/online class

MaryFT: Okay...if you are in Room View then you should see a window called Featured Items...

MaryFT: the demo is in there

MaryFT: Which video did you watch Martha?

MarthaJ: the intro to Tapped In

MaryFT: The cool thing about Camtasia is the ease with which these videos can be created

MaryFT: I made one this morning that took me only 20 minutes

MarthaJ: I have to create an online course for my grad class. I might really want to get to know camtasia better.

MaryFT: If you can talk students through the process in a lecture setting then you can definitely create a Camtasia video of the same content

PamB: I really like having the voice option.

AlejandraW joined the room.

MaryFT: The benefit of Camtasia over lecture is pretty obvious too!

AlejandraW: Hi everyone

PamB: Hi Alejandra

MaryFT: My students love it because it is self-paced and they can watch it when they have time

PamB: We are looking at a tool called Camtasia

MaryFT: Yes Pam, voice definitely helps get the point across and it's easy to include as well.

AlejandraW: Thanks Pam, I will just listen if you don't mindas it is my first time here

MaryFT: I usually record my voice at the same time as I am recording the video

MarthaJ: are the instructions to use it easy to follow and understand?

MaryFT: Even if I flub it, I can go back and edit

MaryFT: Yes...the processes are split into Record, Edit, and Produce and the menu for each is located on the left side of the Camtasia window.

PamB: Alejandra, if you are in the Room View, look at Featured Items, Click on Demo of Camtasia

MaryFT: All the choices are laid out so you don't have to search for them.

AlejandraW: thanks

MarthaJ: what problems did you have starting with it?

MaryFT: To see the menus, try the following TechSmith demo: http://www.techsmith.com/videos/studio/Overview/camtasia_studio_2.html?movie=1

PamB: Mary, I looked at Viewlets but I didn't find it to be simple and easy to use. From what you are saying, Camtasia seems much better.

MaryFT: Let me know when you've had a chance to look at it

MaryFT: I have used both Viewlets and Camtasia and I strongly prefer Camtasia

LoriSi: wow..this is very kewl

MaryFT: Glad you like it Lori

LoriSi: I'm surprised some of my classes have not picked up this program

MarthaJ: If I wanted to add a powerpoint to a web site does this work better then saving powerpoint as a web page?

MaryFT: Viewlets relies on individual screen shots while Camtasia allows me to do what I do naturally

JeffC: It comes bundled with Snagit (to screen capture any part of the screen) and Dubit (to overdub audio). It's around \$100.

SusanR joined the room.

MaryFT: Actually, Martha, I haven't done that yet but I think that you might have greater certainty about the outcome/quality of your PPT if you recorded it in Camtasia

SusanR listens quietly

MaryFT: Camtasia's newest upgrade (free if you already have the program) includes a button that integrates Camtasia with PowerPoint

MarthaJ: So you are just moving through your screen and videoing and talking about what you are doing?

MaryFT: But Lori brought up a really good point...how many classes are using Camtasia style productions?

MaryFT: What are the benefits to students of these types of presentations?

PamB: I viewed a powerpoint on Camtasia today and it was very impressive...so smooth with voice over

MaryFT: That's correct Martha...then you have the opportunity to edit it and add transitions, CallOuts, other video sources, and other sounds

LoriSi: does the website for this program have sample presentations also?

AlejandraW is watching the demo

MaryFT: Yes...

MarthaJ: Having both visuals and sound can really be a benefit for students to comprehend what you are teaching.

SusanR is also watching the demo

PamB: It's a great way to create tutorial for students, such as the one you created for TappedI in

MaryFT: I use it not only to introduce programs but I also use it to give my students ideas for our projects

MaryFT: I slip in a little technology integration theory along the way

LoriSi: this is amazing

MaryFT: I am working with a third grade teacher to create some Camtasia intros for her classroom computer centers

SusanR: impressive

MaryFT: We will see if the kids can watch and then do

LoriSi: this would be great to be able to present a lesson/video to a class while using a SMART White board

SusanR: lots of classroom application

MaryFT: She has been struggling with Computer Centers and this might be a workable solution

LoriSi: I bet it will

MarthaJ: I have a teacher who wants to create a tutorial for ESOL students on a program she uses and this would be great with the audio and visuals.

MarthaJ: She was going to use powerpoint but this would be even better!

MaryFT: I agree Martha! And the Callouts feature would allow her to present important text and/or vocabulary

MaryFT: At the risk of losing everyone...

LoriSi: adaptive students, such as autistic would probably love the lessons

JeffC: Just checked pricing at

http://www.techsmith.com/order/academiclicensing.asp?lid=OrderEduHome ...for educators it is \$169 for the Camtasia/Snagit bundle.

MarthaJ: what does snagit do

SusanR: What is the learning curve for teachers?

SusanR: is it a steep learning curve?

MaryFT: Susan, I was able to pick it up pretty quickly but I've had quite a bit of experience editing video

JeffC: Snagit captures screenshots on a PC... any area you want to capture and turn into a .jpg.

MarthaJ: ok

MaryFT: However, in the early stages, editing is not really necessary...that can come as you get more comfortable

MaryFT: However, making the initial video is simply turning Camtasia on and then performing the process that you want to record

MaryFT: Camtasia records it all seamlessly and then drops it into the program for editing

SusanR . o O (doesn't run on Macs)

MarthaJ: and what format does it save to

MaryFT: No. No Mac version.

JeffC: They have a program called EnSharpen for Macs... not sure how it works though.

MarthaJ: Susan, I feel the same way, but look at snapz pro and imovie

MaryFT: Multiple formats Martha...I generally export to Flash

MarthaJ: what if you weren't saving to a web page

SusanR: I understand

PamB: Have you ever used Macromedia Captivate?

MaryFT: but you can also export as Quicktime, Windows Media, and AVI

MarthaJ: ok

LoriSi: really...I have some experience with quick and wm

MaryFT: You can import many of those formats into PowerPoint or play them from your desktop or burn them to a CD

PamB: You can post it on a desktop or save it to a CD

MaryFT: I find that most (if not all of my students) can access the Flash files and they are so nice and small

MaryFT: So, as a teacher, I have found that Camtasia allows me to present my course materials succinctly

MaryFT: in a manner that allows for the multiple learning styles and readiness levels of a very diverse group of students

PamB: I think I'm sold. I was trying to convince myself to learn viewlets because I was given a copy of it, but now I'm going to download the trial copy of Camtasia.

MaryFT: I generally assign them the videos as "homework" so that we can concentrate on integration/creativity ideas when they are in the classroom

MaryFT: I think it's a good choice Pam

PamB: Do your students create any themselves?

MaryFT: I would like to add that to the curriculum in the near future (many of them have asked!)

MaryFT: I will probably offer it as an option for some of those who are ready to move on

SusanR: Older students would feel quite at home with Camtasia

MarthaJ: I think if you are taking any distance learning courses it should be a part of it.

JudenGst1 joined the room.

MaryFT: I will also be teaching a graduate class in Multimedia for the Classroom and Camtasia will figure prominently

AlejandraW: thank you for the information ... will download and study it later ...must leave

MaryFT: you're welcome Alejandra

PamB: Bye Alejandra

JeffC: Do your students have access to a computer lab with Camtasia accessible Mary?

MaryFT: No...but they are allowed to download the free trial to their profiles

MaryFT: For a Summer course, 30 days will be sufficient

JeffC nods

JudenGst1: What is Camtasia? Sorry....logged on in the middle of conversation

MaryFT: if enough of them request it then, purchasing a site license will be considered

MaryFT: Hi Juden...take a look at

http://www.coe.uh.edu/courses/cuin3113/camtasia.htm for an overview of Camtasia

MaryFT: there are lots of links that demo different features of the software

JudenGst1: thanks

MarthaJ: but I can also see a computer station with it that can be accessed by many teachers.

MaryFT: Also, the trial version of Camtasia is fully featured

LoriSi: that is nice!

MaryFT: which I love...it allows you to really get to know the software

MaryFT: I don't like software trials that prevent you from saving or really using it

MaryFT: Yes Martha, many teachers could share but, unlike some programs, the educational price is not too steep

MarthaJ nods

MaryFT: I bought my copy once I had used up my trial period

MarthaJ: my budget is tight but I might be able to get it

MaryFT: I had so many ideas and I simply couldn't do without it

MaryFT: What sorts of ideas do you all have for using Camtasia in your areas?

LoriSi: so, if you don't mind me asking, what sort of classroom lessons has anyone made

MarthaJ: having teachers create tutorials for students that miss an important instruction.

MaryFT: What about posting in-class PowerPoints to a teacher website so that parents can view them as well?

MarthaJ: I had to show students over close circuit TV how to log onto their laptops. This would have worked so much better

LoriSi: I bet

MaryFT: Lori, do you mean classroom lessons for older students or younger?

MarthaJ: but then you have to keep updating. high school teachers often don't have the time.

MaryFT: No doubt...and the added benefit is that students can rewatch them as many times as they need

LoriSi: either one...I'm certified pe, but am working on projects for my class this semester

JudenGst1: Can you record DVD footage to the program?

MaryFT: I have watched my students use the demos in many different ways. Some watch and do immediately, some watch and take notes, some watch and read the transcripts

MaryFT: Juden, I think you can record anything that you can see on your screen...I haven't tried DVD yet

PamB: I teach curriculum/technology integration with school Librarians and classroom teachers. One of the courses involves creating websites with Front Page. Camtasia would help take the pressure off the students in learning Front Page -- they could view it ahead of time and as many times as they need.

MaryFT: That's one thing I want to point out...to improve accessibility of what is essentially a visual and auditory media, I try to provide a transcript with all the videos I use in class

LoriSi: right, that sounds like a great lesson to view...there's lots to front page

MaryFT: Pam, I have one on FrontPage that I use with my students...they really like it

MaryFT: I am also able to teach them the intricacies of saving to the server and uploading files without anyone getting lost or frustrated

JudenGst1: Do you think Camtasia could be used in a slide show manner?

PamB: I'm going to be teaching blogging next month...Camtasia would be very helpful.

MaryFT: Could you clarify slide show manner?

MaryFT: Pam, I found some videos on using Blogger that I used with my students...I think they were made with Camtasia

JudenGst1: multimedia slide show for presentations with CD audio, DVD, and pictures in one presentation...

PamB: Mary, were they on the web?

MaryFT: free blogger videos: http://movielibrary.lynda.com/html/modPage.asp?ID=113

PamB: YES! I have this CD. It's very good...

MarthaJ: Juden I do know you can do that in imovie

PamB: I didn't know how it was made. NOW I do.

MaryFT: Yes, Juden, Camtasia is supposed to integrate well with PowerPoint and other slide show style software both to record them and you can also put Camtasia videos into PPT

JudenGst1: ah....great

MaryFT: The newest version of Camtasia actually adds a Camtasia button to your PowerPoint toolbar (if you want it) to facilitate full screen recording of your shows

JudenGst1: that's awesome

MaryFT: I haven't tried it yet but I will

MaryFT: I have used Producer in the past and found that the finished products were too bandwidth heavy for most of my students

LoriSi: I just tried it out...amazingly easy

MaryFT claps for Lori

JudenGst1 smiles

PamB: This tool is awesome!

MarthaJ: Mary, thanks for sharing

MaryFT: Yay! I am so glad you like it

MaryFT: So...does anyone want to brainstorm other things that you could use it for?

MaryFT: We only have 5 mins or so left

LoriSi: I had real problems with media encoder and windows movie maker...

SusanR: Could it be used for electronic "photo albums" or student yearbooks or electronic portfolios?

JudenGst1: Yes

PamB: Maybe we should all download Camtasia and meet here next month in Web Tools to share our experiences.

MaryFT: I bet it could...it would certainly make them more accessible than most tools that students currently use for that

MaryFT: I'd like that

LoriSi: I would probably use it to demonstrate a new type of activity or game, rules, something the students can see about activity or some health issue, how the body works, systems in the body

JudenGst1: Most definately, Lori!

MaryFT: I'd like to see that Lori

LoriSi: too many pe teachers do not take advantage of technology

PamB nods

LoriSi: I would need some time to work on it, but I think I have a great idea to practice

MaryFT: Accessible in that its easier to learn than MovieMaker/Premiere and more widely accessible than the newer versions of PowerPoint

JudenGst1 left the room.

PamB: Mary, Thank you so much! This evening has been so informative...and fun!

MaryFT: Glad you all could join in...I had a great time! I am headed over to the Teacher Education Forum now

LoriSi: thanks for the links...in my class discussion...I will be sure to mention this newly learned info...thanks bunches

MaryFT: You're very welcome Lori

PamB: You did a great job!

SusanR: Thank you Mary and Pam. .. a neat application

MaryFT: Thank you for the chance to do this...it was great fun

PamB: Great! We'll all share what we learned tonight.

PamB: Good night everyone
