BJB2: The creators of http://www.SpellBEE.org have just launched http://www.PatternBEE.org Both new websites, like Spellbee.org, are FREE and are part of a scientific study of a new kind of interaction discovered at the Brandeis University DEMO lab.

SusanR: I remember SpellBee

DonnaH: I don't.

DonnaH: pattern bee?

DonnaH: hrm.

DonnaH: (could feasibly use that.)

BJB2: next Tuesday at 9pm EST

DonnaH: one 14 year old sent in a story...(get this) with her catholic high school email address.

DonnaH: which of course, had her full name.

BJB2: Donna, you should join the cybersafety discussion

DonnaH: Another student, I can tell you how old she was, her full name, had her PICTURE...

BJB2 . o O (meets next Monday)

DonnaH: what time?

DonnaH: So what I want to do is help parents know how to check how safe their kids are online.

LouiseBG joined the room.

BJB2: 8pm EST

DonnaH: how to save im chats, teach them to help their kids pick out appropriate screen names

SusanR: Have you seen ethics in computing

BJB2: Hi, Louise

SusanR: http://ethics.csc.ncsu.edu/

DonnaH: (ie, kitten13 is NOT appropriate)

LouiseBG: Hi,

DonnaH: I haven't Sue.

SusanR: This is a website worthwhile exploring...

SusanR: A well-chosen list of links in all areas of computer ethics including copyright, intellectual property, e-commerce, hacking etc...

SusanR: recommended by our tech integrators

DonnaH: How to do vanity searches on their kids (type in the kids name to a search engine; make sure info isn't all out there...check their screennames too, make sure they aren't being completely stupid)

DonnaH: The safety issues about blogging.

DonnaH: (HUGE safety issues with blogging)

SusanR: we can only use bloglines

DonnaH: blogs are fine,b as long as they are locked.

DonnaH: (I hang out with the wrong sorts of people...truly...) blogs are stomping grounds for predators...

DonnaH: all the info they need is in those things.

DonnaH: ages, who their friends are, their birthdays, what school, what activities...

JeffC remembers to change his kitten13 login on eblogger...

SusanR hoots with laughter

DonnaH: no no no...eblogger is not the 'in' thing with the teenyboppers...now Live Journal

DonnaH: that's a different story.

DonnaH: but the point is, a lot of parents aren't aware there are other ways of checking up on the kids online beside sitting with them...which they aren't really going to do.

DonnaH: and kids KNOW IT.

DonnaH: so even if a parent doesn't do any of those things, kids knowing their parents know it, can use that to their advantage.

JeffC: I said... uh huh... let's go see how free free really is.

JeffC: so... lesson learned.

JeffC: trouble is... most parents and teachers really don't have a clue... and more importantly... don't *want* to have a clue. That's why most districts try and ban everything they can... thinking that's the way to safety.

JeffC: of course... the students figure out a way around it and then can declare "but it wasn't filtered!"

JeffC: this is of course a ludicrous approach to anything.

JeffC: teachers *know* that tech is something the kids love... but since they don't have a full grasp on it themselves... they ignore it in the classroom for the most part.
