**JenniferMF**: You went there on vacation you mean???

NaliniS: yes

**JenniferMF**: wow!!! I just googled it. When did you go??

**NaliniS**: I am doing the desert biome in my room But am also doing the grassland coral reef and tundra

**NaliniS**: I went during the spring break 9-18

**JenniferMF**: oh my gosh, that is so wonderful, I'm happy for you, it must have been spectacular!

**NaliniS**: Mrs.Singhal, do you remember her also on the SLA, is doing deciduous, taiga and wetland

**JenniferMF**: I think I do. That sounds like fun. Good idea-- that biome project sounds great-- and fun!

**NaliniS**: It was .so high and guess what there is a beautiful terrace there you can just sit there with a binoculars and watch for hours

**NaliniS**: the hummingbirds come so close to you, in fact if we put out our hand and stay still they come and sit

**JenniferMF**: wow! Who went with you?

**NaliniS**: I saw the scarlet ibis

**NaliniS**: 1000's

**NaliniS**: in the Caroni wetland

**NaliniS**: along with the egrets

**JenniferMF**: you are making me a little jealous!

**JenniferMF**: I don't recall getting it. Did you send via Tapped In or regular email?

NaliniS: I think via Tapped In

**JenniferMF**: I will look for it; I really don't think I got it.

**NaliniS**: If you get a chance you should go.

**JenniferMF**: I was hoping to show anyone who showed up tonight the new All About Birds website...

**NaliniS**: Looks like it is just us

**JenniferMF**: They have really made so much progress on the "tips for bird ID" pages!

**NaliniS**: It looks great and easy to follow

**JenniferMF**: It is very similar in arrangement to BirdSleuth: starting with size and shape... then working through clues to field marks.

**NaliniS**: I was just browsing the site

NaliniS: I didn't know Tampa also has so many birds

**NaliniS**: I took your bird test and did so badly

**JenniferMF**: They also have a bird guide to North American bird... so it would have Tampa and NY birds, but not Trinidad birds (that don't migrate there)...http://www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/search

**JenniferMF**: Ha! That test is hard. Don't be too hard on yourself =)

**JenniferMF**: no Scarlet Ibis on the search engine for All About Birds.

**BJB2**: there is an indigo bunting :-) We have one coming to our feeder

**JenniferMF**: That's a pretty bird!!

**BJB2** agrees

**BJB2**: scarlet ibis is pretty impressive too!

**NaliniS**: are the indigo buntings found in NY

**JenniferMF**: Wow, it is the national bird of Trinidad =)

**BJB2**: wow, they're pretty wide-spread in the US

**JenniferMF**: lots in the east.

**NaliniS**: yes but only during summer I think

**NaliniS**: for breeding

**NaliniS**: winter they go south

BJB2 nods

**BJB2**: hummingbirds are back too

**NaliniS**: it also says they are not urban birds

**BJB2**: that's a good desert bird for your students, Nalini

**NaliniS**: you mean the indigo

**BJB2**: no, the hummingbird

NaliniS: ah

**BJB2**: in laws used to get lots of them at their feeders. Ours are too territorial...usually only get one at a time, no matter how many feeders we have out

**NaliniS**: I didn't realize that the deserts had so many birds

**JenniferMF**: hmm... let me see if there is anything on deserts in AAB website...

NaliniS: funny did you know that there are desert tortoise

NaliniS: I didn't

NaliniS: I have it already on my website

**BJB2**: cool Nalini!

**NaliniS**: this is one of my class blogs

NaliniS: each class has their own

**NaliniS**: for esl students I use enchanted learning

**JenniferMF**: wow, I am loving the blog. I'm getting totally distracted by it =)

**JenniferMF**: I love the student comments about what the deserts should look like.

**NaliniS**: I just start the threads for them

NaliniS: yes

NaliniS: I will post the photos on the blog once they are finished

NaliniS: I took them to the AMNH to get an idea

**NaliniS**: and do some research

**JenniferMF**: Just wonderful. I wish you had been my teacher =)

BJB2: me too!

**JenniferMF**: Such a great learning experience, and allowing them to be creative and excited!

**JenniferMF**: Your students are quite lucky.

NaliniS: thank you

NaliniS: they are a good group too

**NaliniS**: We have a great team of science teachers in our school
