**BjB**: Welcome to today's WriteTalk discussion

**JosephA**: I can't wait, I've been looking forward to it all day.

**BjB**: Sandy, let's start with introductions, please.

SandraS: wonderful, BJ

**BjB**: I teach remedial communication in Pennsylvania

**SandraS**: I teach literature and writing here in Alabama, college level

**JosephA**: My name is Joseph Acevedo, I am a student working on becoming a teacher. I'm from Kingsville, Tx.

SandraS: Welcome, Joseph

**SandraS**: Joseph, would you mind sharing where you are a student?

**JosephA**: I'm a student at Texas A&M University Kingsville

SandraS: cool

SandraS: I did my graduate work at UT Austin

**JeffC**: I'm on Tapped In Helpdesk, an ex-English teacher... am also interested in perhaps working towards a grant with the Gates Foundation on using speech to text in K-4 schools.

JosephA: cool

SandraS: woohoooo

SandraS: Gates Foundation grant sounds good

SandraS: Welcome to WriteTalk

**SandraS**: I usually start with a spiel about the National Writing Project

**SandraS**: and then we go on to whatever the topic is

**BjB** listens to the spiel

**SandraS**: THe NWP is a professional development organization

**SandraS**: that started in 1973

SandraS: at UC Berkeley

**SandraS**: three tenets are central to the organization

**SandraS**: that teachers are the best teachers of other teachers

**SandraS**: (no canned inservice or professional development)

SandraS: that teachers teach writing more effectively if they improve their own writing

SandraS: and that writing is a great learning tool across all subjects

**SandraS**: the NWP is federally funded

**SandraS**: and funding has to be renewed each year

**SandraS**: the budget hovers around 30 million dollars

SandraS: and it

SandraS: is money very well spent

**SandraS**: there are close to 200 sites nationally

SandraS: all at universities

**SandraS**: serving primarily k-12 teachers

**SandraS**: great bridges across k-12 and universities

**SandraS**: the core program at each site is the Summer Institute

**SandraS**: there's an annual convention

**SandraS**: national writing retreats

**SandraS**: areas that concentrate on ELL, Reading, urban initiatives...

**SandraS**: Any questions so far, Joseph?

**JosephA**: What is the website?

**SandraS**: aha! you anticipated my next move...

SandraS: I'll give the url and if you want to go visit for a bit and then come back here,

that would be great

**SandraS**: you can check the link for the map at the top and see if there's a site near you

**SandraS**: http://www.writingproject.org

**SandraS**: Joseph, just let me know when you're back here, and we'll continue.

**JosephA**: I'm back I saved the website under my favorites.

SandraS: ok, excellent

**SandraS**: there are a ton of resources

**SandraS**: you can also see publication

**SandraS**: The Quarterly is the main journal

**SandraS**: it's searchable and online

**SandraS**: so lots of great articles

**SandraS**: any questions, Joseph?

**JosephA**: no I'm fine. thanks

SandraS: great

**SandraS**: ok, so this evening I thought we'd play

**SandraS**: I'm not sure how this will work with a small group, so we may need to revise

the plan later

**BiB** nods

**SandraS**: But I have two plans for writing.

**SandraS**: Let's talk about the one we probably can't do....the Partner Poems.

**SandraS**: I uploaded a file that describes the two activities and also provides some URLS

**SandraS**: Joseph, if you look on top of this chat box

JosephA: yes

**SandraS**: you should see the file under "check this out..."

**SandraS**: it's labeled "WriteTalk14june07.doc"

**SandraS**: I thought I'd come up with the term "partner poem," but like everything in teaching, a gazillion other brilliant teachers have come up with the same idea!

**SandraS**: Lots of variations with partner poems

**SandraS**: The first url I give shows examples where one writer poses a question starting with "Why.."

**SandraS**: The partner does not see the question.

**SandraS**: But the partner writes an answer starting with "Because..."

**SandraS**: The partners put the two parts together to form one line of the poem.

**SandraS**: Let's see if I can put the URL up here and we can all take a look at it....

**SandraS**: http://www.mcps.org/linkous/creativity/partnerpoems.html

**BjB** chuckles

SandraS: cool, eh?

**SandraS**: actually, we could try this right now...

**BjB**: perfect for that age group

**SandraS**: I had envisioned us pairing off and using the personal message option of

tapped in

**SandraS**: but I think we can just do it together right here

**BiB** nods

**SandraS**: how about if BJ and Jeff come up with Why questions

**SandraS**: and Joseph and I can come up with a Because phrase

SandraS: then we'll put it together

**BjB**: you want the why questions entered in chat?

**SandraS**: how does that sound?

**SandraS**: yes...after we've all come up with our phrases....

**BjB**: ok

**JosephA**: sounds good

**SandraS**: so, think of your phrase

**SandraS**: you can type it in the chat line, but just wait to enter until I ask you to...

SandraS: BJ, why don't you start with your why phrase and then I'll enter my phrase...

**BjB**: Why do birds sing?

**SandraS**: because angels read comic books

**SandraS**: Jeff, if you have a why phrase, please enter it and then Joseph you can enter your because phrase...

**BjB**: well, gosh, that makes sense to me!

SandraS: heh!

**JeffC**: Why do fools fall in love?

SandraS: I agree

**JosephA**: because I'm pretty

SandraS guffaws

SandraS: ok, that was fun

**SandraS**: I want to do one more set...anybody else game?

**SandraS**: we can reverse

**BjB** nods

JosephA: sure

SandraS: Joseph and I can do the why questions and BJ and Jeff can do the because

phrases....

SandraS: Let's do Joseph and Bj

SandraS: and then me and Jeff

**JosephA**: Why do hippos like water?

**BjB**: Because time waits for no man (or woman).

**SandraS**: Why is the grass green?

SandraS: Well, we'll leave that question for now...

**SandraS**: Ok, any thoughts about applications?

**BjB** . o O ( Jeff is on the phone )

**Jeff**C: Because elephants tiptoed through the tulips.

**SandraS**: How would this be helpful in the classroom..

**BjB** laughs

SandraS: Great line, Jeff...

**JeffC** is multitasking (as usual)

**JosephA**: It would make the students get more involved with writing. They'll have fun at

the funny things they create.

SandraS: I agree, Joseph

**SandraS**: I think it takes the pressure off, too

SandraS: because there's this formula

**SandraS**: and because you don't see what the other person writes

**BjB**: and there is no right or wrong answer!

SandraS: yeah!

**SandraS**: you can see, too, that we had fun...so any grade level, eh?

**JosephA**: I think that any grade would appreciate that.

**SandraS**: it could draw out reluctant writers

**SandraS**: also illustrates that writing can be collaborative

**SandraS**: I think there are all kinds of ways one could structure partner poems

**SandraS**: not only for writing but also for performing

SandraS: but there was a really cool article about using partner poems to deal with

stereotypes

SandraS: and I included the url on the file

SandraS: the article is written by two teachers who met at the Portland Writing Project

**SandraS**: I'm telling ya, writing project teachers come up with great stuff!

SandraS: an African American and an Asian American teacher met

**SandraS**: and worked up this idea for partner poems

**SandraS**: if you go to the url

SandraS: check the right menu and click on their poem "A Woman of Color" and just

read that....then come on back....

**BjB**: cool...different descriptions of the same object

**JosephA**: That is awesome.

**SandraS**: right...the authors talk about that

**SandraS**: I agree Joseph

**SandraS**: the article is great, too...both teachers talk about how they came up with the

ideas and what they did in their separate classrooms

SandraS: what worked, how they would tweak the lesson

SandraS: so that's a more in-depth complex use of partner poems than the Why-Because

ones...

**SandraS**: any thoughts? comments? questions?

**JosephA**: Were they given a set of questions to answer independently?

**SandraS**: you mean the students in the classes or the two teachers writing the poem?

**BjB**: you could use any topic....I wish or I feel poems would be fun

JosephA: Both

SandraS nods to BJ

**SandraS**: the teachers worked it through on their own

**SandraS**: then with their classes, they had the students read the poem

**SandraS**: and identify the areas

SandraS: but the classes had been talking about stereotypes in the media for a while

before that

JosephA: Cool

**SandraS**: they used T-charts to show the areas and the descriptions

**SandraS**: then they paired the students

**SandraS**: and students came up with their own areas and their own descriptions

**SandraS**: the authors of the articles discussed when there were snags

**SandraS**: some students couldn't find categories...

**SandraS**: so the teachers worked with them

**CarolE** joined the room.

SandraS: Hello, Carol

CarolE: Hi

**CarolE**: Is there a session now?

SandraS: Yes, we are in WriteTalk

**SandraS**: We've been talking about partner poems.

**SandraS**: Would you like to introduce yourself?

CarolE: Sure. ---- Hi! I am Carol.

**BjB** smiles

CarolE: I teach in a middle school in NJ.

SandraS: Welcome!

**JosephA**: Hello Carol.

CarolE: Hi!

**SandraS**: OK, the next thing on the agenda is Round-robin blitz prompts!

**SandraS**: Here's how it works:

**SandraS**: I start by yelling out (typing out) a prompt

**SandraS**: and everyone writes for a minute

**SandraS**: then I yell time and call on someone else, who then yells out another prompt

and we all write for a minute

SandraS: and so on

SandraS: what we'll do here is that as soon as I call time,

SandraS: you can enter what you've written

**SandraS**: so when you write on the prompt, just type in the chat box, but don't enter until

you see I've called time....

**SandraS**: does that make sense?

JosephA: yes

CarolE: yes

SandraS: wonderful...

**SandraS**: here's the first prompt

**SandraS**: spring dusk

SandraS: TIME

**SandraS**: spring dusk sings harp song tickles one toads underbelly and kisses me goodnight

**BjB**: I sit in the afterglow and breathe in the smells of new life. Warmth seeps from the earth and travels back to the sky

**JosephA**: I was walking outside one night when all of a sudden I came upon a cow, who was minding her own business. I looked around and realized what time of the year it was, it was spring, how I loved winter, and dreaded the spring. I then saw that it was almost time for my brother to wake up and milk the cow, I

**CarolE**: I am experiencing writers block. sorry.

SandraS applauds wonderful writing

**SandraS**: no problem Carol

**SandraS**: when I do any kind of freewriting

**SandraS**: I always talk about the guidelines for freewriting that I use

**SandraS**: If it's ok, I'll interrupt this round-robin just to go over those...

**SandraS**: they're adapted from Natalie Goldberg's \_Writing Down the Bones\_

**SandraS**: and she has 7 guidelines

SandraS: Keep your hand moving

**SandraS**: in this case, keep tapping on the keyboard

**SandraS**: this cuts through our internal editor

**SandraS**: Lose control

CarolE smiles

**SandraS**: this means don't worry about etiquette or being polite

SandraS: Be specific

**SandraS**: try to be specific (green dented 57 chevy...instead of car)

SandraS: but don't worry if you can't think of specifics

**SandraS**: Don't worry about spelling, punctuation, grammar...

SandraS: that's a great rule

SandraS: Don't think

**SandraS**: that means just take the first thoughts that come up

**SandraS**: You're free to write the worst junk in America

**SandraS**: I love that guideline...

SandraS: and

**SandraS**: Go for the jugular

**SandraS**: that means when you feel something, follow it...don't avoid it

SandraS: ok, so those guidelines help with any kind of free writing

**SandraS**: or timed writing practice, as Goldberg calls it

CarolE: Thank you.

**JosephA**: Those are great.

SandraS: My pleasure...I've got a file for those ... I think it's in this room...I'll check in a

bit...

**SandraS**: ok, I get to choose someone to give the next prompt

**SandraS**: then we write again

**SandraS**: I yell time

**SandraS**: we enter our writing...

**SandraS**: Joseph?

**JosephA**: Samurai warriors

SandraS: TIME

SandraS: Samurai warriors swing swords swiftly

**CarolE**: In a heated fight the Samurai warriors worked through the room defeating all of the evil rabbits. The evil rabbit had been forcing the children to eat their vegetables for far to long.

**SandraS**: Samurai warriors swing swords swiftly

**JosephA**: That's a good one Carol, very creative.

**SandraS** chuckels at Carol's evil rabbit

CarolE smiles

**BjB**: samurai fat string creeps up butt crack

SandraS guffaws

CarolE: Very good!

**SandraS**: Samurai warriors swing swords swiftly singing silly spring songs sitting softly and knitting afghans

CarolE: Neat!

SandraS: cool! ok, Joseph you get to choose the next person to do the prompt

**JosephA**: Okay, Carol.

CarolE: morning coffee

SandraS: TIME

**JosephA**: I awake each morning and remember the nigh as a child that Santa Claus told me he no longer wanted milk he wanted coffee in order to stay awake all night and he would give me that nintendo I wanted so badly. I now drink coffee every day and night, hoping that one day it will be morning and I can wake up and say hello to the entire world who will sing songs while being hyper with coffee. Coffee is very beautiful in texture and in smell

**CarolE**: The sweet smell of morning coffee filled the room, but it was the smell of bacon that actually awoke Sara. It had been a long time since she had....
