RichardZ: So where do I go now

TinaK: Is there something going on in the TI reception room right now?

TinaK: The reason I ask is because I see one of my classmates in there right now and she may not know where to go - her name is **XiaoxiaoF**

TinaK: I sent her a private chat message but if she is like me, she may not know how to get to the forum

BjB: she's working her way here....give me a minute

TinaK: Thanks

JeffC: exactly... and with the emphasis on mainstreaming there should be more cross-curricular support for SPED and pretty much all disciplines

JeffC: I'm mostly interested in seeing groups here collaborate in general, and think the SPED Forum should link with PE, K-12 Language Arts, Math and Science Resources and a few other groups. Teachers need to support each other across curricula in general, and with SPED in particular.

BjB: we usually start Tapped In discussions with introductions...

BjB: please tell Paul, the leader of this discussion, where you are located and what you teach or hope to teach

BjB: I'm a retired communication teacher located in Pennsylvania

ChristinBo: I am located in Staten Island NY, I am a student in the masters degree program and I hope to teach elementary ed

JeffC: I'm on Tapped In Helpdesk, ex-English teacher (amongst other things) and in Forest Grove Oregon.

PaulDB: I am a retired correctional education administrator with a background in special education from Florida.

BjB: Lauren, go to Actions and send to pasteboard

RichardZ: I'm still trying to open it

BjB: then copy the url and paste it to a blank browser window

BjB: hold down the ctrl key when you click, Richard

BjB: Tina, did you get the url?

RichardZ: I'm back on the main screen

RichardZ: Special edu. forum

JeffC: http://snurl.com/tiered

TinaK: I am back to Tapped In but my popup blocker was on - so let me try again.

BjB: where are you back on the main screen, Richard?

RichardZ: welcome page

JeffC: that's a redirect to the site Bj linked to if you can't click, just type it in another tab: http://snurl.com/tiered

BjB nods.

BjB: Tina? Richard?

RichardZ: still trying

TinaK: I got it but I am not sure if I am in the right spot with you guys - all my prior dialog went away -

BjB: that dialogue will be in your transcript, Tina

JeffC: Tiered Intervention Search Engine http://snurl.com/tiered

LaurenW: got it

TinaK: Okay thanks - I thought I held down control earlier - sorry bout that

BjB: If you see the Tiered Intervention site, read the first paragraph

JeffC: accepting popups from Tapped In is best

BjB: State and Federal legislation and regulation have established rigorous academic standards, as well as safety and health expectations for our schools and students. This presents a number of challenges for public schools and the corresponding diverse and changing student populations. Schools must:

BjB: o Differentiate instruction to maximize student achievement and prevent/address academic problems

BjB: o Provide a safe and disciplined learning environment to prevent and address challenging behavior.

BjB: o Consider and partially address the increased incidence of health related issues that students bring to schools and/or experience in schools, which may also interfere with school achievement and contribute to challenging school behavior.

ChristinBo: yes XiaoxiaoF: yes LaurenW: yes TinaK: yes RichardZ: yes **RichardZ**: open it up? **BjB**: click on Academic Problems and we'll take a quick look **BjB**: you will see that on that page they address three factors...school, teacher and student **BjB**: when you click on any of the hyperlinks you will get either a new webpage or a pdf document **BjB**: I selected Classroom Management under Teacher Factor and opened a PDF **BjB**: within those documents there is usually one or more hyperlinks that lead to more resources **BjB**: if you look at the red menu on the left of the page you can also narrow the focus to a specific discipline **BjB**: everyone with me so far? LaurenW: yes ChristinBo: yes BibiA: yes TinaK: yes XiaoxiaoF: yes **BjB**: if you close the pdf, at the bottom of the screen is **BjB**: Return to Homepage. Click on that

BjB: and this time let's look at Special Education in the red menu

BjB: The webinar led us through the Academic Problems tab on the left of the screen. Do you

BjB: then click on Special Education Programs in the new red menu

BjB: each one of the topics listed has subtopics and hyperlinks!

BjB: as you can see, this is a fairly complex resource

BjB: Richard, you might want to return to the home page and look at Health Concerns

RichardZ: ok sorry I was looking at the Autism program

BjB: that's great!

BjB: The webinar took over an hour going over the siteI'm just introducing you to it as a resource

BjB: does anyone have any comments or questions?

ChristinBo: not at the moment

XiaoxiaoF: no

TinaK: There are many great resources and ideas here

LaurenW: no

SusanR joined the room.

BjB nods to Tina...that's why I thought you might find it useful across the curriculum

BibiA: very intensive source

PaulDB: Hello Susan.

BjB waves hi to Sue

SusanR: Hi Bj and company

BjB: We're looking at http://ntuaft.com/TISE/home.html, Sue

RichardZ: these are all good links with good info.

SusanR: just about to ask..thanks

BjB: I like that there are so many interdisciplinary resources available....and viable solutions to quite a few topics

TinaK: And they even include rubrics for evaluating

BjB nods to Tina

BjB: did anyone find something they especially like and want to share?

RichardZ: I will highly recommend this site

PaulDB: What is even better is that the material is presented not in a stand-alone format but rather in a cross-discipline manner.

PaulDB: Encouraging users to think of how the material can be employed or implemented within a variety of settings with a diverse population of students.

BjB: The information on this site is also available on a DVD that you can request from the State of NJ

DavidW joined the room.

RichardZ: I only buy things from TEXAS

PaulDB: Hello David.

RichardZ: Just playing around

DavidW: Hi. Paul

BjB smiles....go for it, Richard ;-)

PaulDB: Does one order through the New Jersey Department of Education?

TinaK: I like the activities that are shown - even if it is not for my grade level, it gives you ideas and you can adjust to your content area

BjB: and take a couple of minutes to explore....then come back and share

KimDr joined the room.

BjB: Hi, Kim. Welcome

PaulDB: Hello Kim

KimDr: Hello!

BjB: anyone back yet?

TinaK: well I looked at the Technology part - and it gives lots and lots of links for implementing technology in the classroom. It would take awhile to look at it but it is another great resource

BjB: Cool, thanks, Tina

BibiA: i got it

BjB cheers for Bibi

KimDr: thanks for the tip!

BjB: anyone else find something useful?

PaulDB: Instruction/Behavior and Professional Development/Personnel offer additional information about RTI and IRIS respectively.

XiaoxiaoF: I chose the early childhood, and I was interested in the part of Technical Assistance center on Social Emotional Intervention for young children, which is important for young children to develop social and emotional behaviour.

ChristinBo: I was looking under the early childhood link under CELL and found some of the things there interesting. Since I work in a daycare I think that a lot of the practices they suggest would be helpful. There is a lot of information here to consider and I would need more time to look through it better

IsaacG: is there any way that we can look up rooms that are covering specific topics

KimDr: I am also new to this, but I like it. I can be very helpful.

LaurenW: me too

TinaK: New here also but really liked it

BjB: The strength of Tapped In is in the community..the people!

BjB: each of you has something to contribute...and you demonstrated that beautifully today!

PaulDB: People, please remember that you do not operate in isolation, you are a part of something much bigger. Tonight you have been exposed to what others are doing and maybe you will take from this evening a new skill or a new piece of information that will help one or more of your students tomorrow. BjB: you're welcome, Bibi

IsaacG: are the only rooms the ones that are on the calendar or is there a way that you can access other rooms discussing different topics

DavidW: The calendar shows you the public discussions that are scheduled in Tapped In, Isaac

BjB: Isaac, most people who log in do so to participate in the calendar events

BjB: others who log in are usually participating in private classes

IsaacG: ok that's good to know

DavidW: Although certain rooms/groups may be designated for specific topics, it doesn't mean that there is activity in them - people holding discussions - all the time

IsaacG: wasn't really sure how things work on here

BjB: if you click on the ONLINE tab to the left of this chat you will see everyone who is logged in and where they are

BjB: and some groups communicate asynchronously via the threaded discussion boards in each room

BjB . o O (it's difficult to meet all the needs of everyone's schedule and time zone)

DavidW: And you can arrange to hold your own discussions, Isaac, if you would like

IsaacG: regarding people that hold their own discussions is there a way to reserve a spot on the calendar

BjB: you can request to present a calendar event, Isaac...

BjB: but it must be open to anyone who wishes to participate

IsaacG: ok

BjB: you can also create your own group, Isaac

SusanR leaves to prepare for her session tomorrow

BjB waves bye. I too need to leave.

DavidW waves to Sue

IsaacG: how do you create your own group is it the same as having ur own office?

BjB: Isaac, join one of the tours....you'll have a better idea of what you can do here

BjB: offices and groups are not the same

DavidW: As a TI member, Isaac, you can create two groups

IsaacG: ok sounds good I appreciate all of your help

BjB lets David explain groups

SusanR waves bye

BjB heads off into the sunset

DavidW hugs Bj

PaulDB: Guess I will call it quits tonight. I has been very interesting and I will use much of what came from tonight's session when I teach this coming Saturday Session for the local community college.

DavidW: Paul, quick question...?

DavidW: I can answer a few more questions for you, Isaac, if you like

PaulDB: Okay.

DavidW: Any thoughts on UDL (Universal Design for Learning) and special education?

DavidW . o O (may be a BIG question)

PaulDB: I am a strong believer in UDL for special education. It seems to me that it is an approach that returns special education to its roots.

BjB . o O (maybe a topic for next month, Paul?)

IsaacG left the room.

DavidW: That's my initial response to it, allowing for multiple ways of presenting material - working with a school that is trying to use it as a model, but it doesn't always seem to be well understood by some of the teachers

DavidW . o O (especially a special ed. teacher)

PaulDB: Sometimes I think we have forgotten that special education is intended to help kids who have difficulties learn how to learn but UDL seems to offer an alternative that can be very effective.

PaulDB: How have you defined/presented the material to the school?

DavidW: I'm just observing that although there is a push to use UDL principles - still a lot of teachers are mostly at the front of the room, speaking a lot of the time

PaulDB: UDL appears to me to operate from the premise that the student's learning is what is important not the teachers teaching.

DavidW: There is more technology at hand, but not always a clear sense of how to use it to address some of the issues

DavidW . o O (both seem important)

DavidW: teachers need to learn how all their students can learn

IsaacG: I agree that it is very critical in order to be a successful teacher that one must be aware of how their students best learn

DavidW nods

PaulDB: As an option, maybe you would want to talk about what kids need to learn, then talk about how teachers will know if kids have learned the material, and finally, talk about what teachers think they should do differently to improve student learning.

IsaacG: David are you referring to the different learning styles of students

DavidW: I had asked Paul a question about Universal Design for Learning (UDL), Isaac - it does take into account learning styles

IsaacG: I just entered the room and noticed your comment didn't catch the rest of your conversation

DavidW: Working with a not particularly strong teacher...not strong in math at all (my focus) and it's hard to support her

PaulDB: How students learn is highly individualized, teachers must operate from the belief that all kids can learn. Then it becomes a matter of determining what each kid can learn.

DavidW: At times this teacher is NOT convinced that the students can learn...part of the problem

PaulDB: Sounds like the Hawthorne effect at play.

DavidW smiles

DavidW: Yes, I think that happens a lot

DavidW: Thanks, Paul - I was curious if you had an opinion on UDL as a framework

PaulDB: I would suggest doing a task analysis of a student's performance. Doing so will allow the teacher to find where the student is deficit (if that is the situation) in his/her learning.

DavidW nods

PaulDB: Sometimes a student cannot move to the next level because there is a gap in learning at the lower level.

DavidW: yes - that's very true for a number of the students in this class

PaulDB: Doing a task analysis will point out that gap if the analysis is conducted fairly and completely.

DavidW: I wonder if that gets done at all - I'll try to determine that on the next visit

PaulDB: It might not be a common practice because it may reveal a weakness in the teaching activity.
