BJ: Let's do intros, in case someone else joins us

**BJ** . o O ( people have been running late ) **BarbaraMu**: okay- it's the holiday shopping

**BJ:** That's a great topic, Barbara...applies to any discipline

RobertBY: Thank you for the reception

BarbaraMu: Organization, for school, usually involves a number of skill sets.

BarbaraMu: They usually include goal setting, time management, specific study skills,

BarbaraMu: Note taking, listening, and practice.

**RobertBY**: I am interested in a possible career in this area.

**BarbaraMu**: Great! Is there a level that you are most interested in working?

**RobertBY**: Greetings to BJ and Barbara **RobertBY**: I am looking at High school

**BarbaraMu**: There are sites worth going to for each of the subskills and others which talk about all of the skills in one place.

**BarbaraMu**: Although I am elementary, there are definitely HS resources that I will be using tonight.

**RobertBY**: Your suggestion?

**BarbaraMu**: Family Education Network has some printables for keeping kids organized which are great to share with parents. They involve cutting and pasting the things they are to remember.

BJ: Robert, I have two suggestions...

**RobertBY**: Please

**BJ:** first, go to the Actions drop down menu and click on DETACH

**BJ:** that will make it easier to follow the dialogue

**RobertBY**: Location?

**RobertBY**: Thank you for the advice

**BJ:** http://familyeducation.com/printables/package/0,2358,23-16624,00.html

BarbaraMu: I think it's too long!

**RobertBY**: Are there schools that you recommend for becoming a counselor?

**BJ:** nope, can't get it in one line...do this, Robert...go to the actions drop down menu again...and scroll down to send to pasteboard

**BJ** . o O ( it's the comma, Barbara, not the length )

**BJ:** once you have the pasteboard up, you can highlight and use control C to copy. Then past to a browser window

**BarbaraMu**: My next one has a comma too BJ but has lots of good information. There aren't any more like that after this one...

**BarbaraMu**: For specific skills, and assessing strengths and weaknesses for a given study skill area, Family Education again has a good package- including a homework kit

BJ: worst case scenario...we'll have to wait for our transcripts to look at the urls

**BarbaraMu**: Okay- worth the wait. These contain a lot of good information. The last makes a lot of references to ADD and learning disabilities but that's often where the best organizational and study skill information is.

RobertBY: Time to go. Talk soon,

**BarbaraMu**: www.schwablearning.org/articles.asp?r=364 is one of those organizations which tackles LD. They have a good section on study strategies

**RobertBY** left the room (signed off).

**BJ:** I'm familiar with Schwab Learning

**BarbaraMu**: Aside from the learning disability sites, another good source of study skill information are the college and university study center sites. Here are a couple, and though housed on college sites, their information is good for all.

**BJ:** do you use anything like the inspiration software to help students organize?

**BarbaraMu**: I haven't used it. What is your experience with it, BJ?

**BJ:** not extensive experience...it's a mind map/graphic organizer type program

**BarbaraMu**: At the elementary levels, everything is heavily color coded for the little ones.

**BarbaraMu**: Checklists, and flip charts and posters are the primary memory joggers for routines and practice.

**BJ:** Inspiration has a younger student version: Kidspiration

**BarbaraMu**: Do you want to put up a url?

**BJ:** let's try www.kidspiration.com

**BarbaraMu**: That's cool. I don't think teachers use mapping enough...this looks very good.

**BarbaraMu**: A more kid-friendly looking site can be found at <a href="http://www.how-to-study.com/">http://www.how-to-study.com/</a>

**BarbaraMu**: Not more kid-friendly than kidspiration- but more so than the college sites! **BJ** smiles and nods.
