**MichaelH**: we're expecting a drop of about 30 degrees by tomorrow p.m.

**MichaelH**: Monica, the grand prize is a four day trip to Illinois for the winning student and his/her parent... with the final stop in Springfield for the opening of the Lincoln Museum

**DavidWe** . o O ( free chocolate? )

**MichaelH**: I dunno, David... but four days in Illinois would be a dream come true, wouldn't it?

DavidWe: Absolutely! Especially in Springfield

MichaelH: that museum is supposed to be really cool

**DavidWe** liked Peoria when he visited there

**MichaelH**: we went to Springfield about 11 years ago, but I haven't been back since

**MichaelH**: took the girls to the Lincoln Home, etc.

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, there is a great deal in central Illinois about Abraham Lincoln, who is considered one of the greatest, if not the greatest American leader

**MichaelH**: oh, check out <a href="http://www.c-span.org/classroom/lincolncontest/">http://www.c-span.org/classroom/lincolncontest/</a>, David

DavidWe nods and checks

**DavidWe** was at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., on Memorial Day, 2004

**MichaelH**: The contest is very interesting... students must discuss the idea of a "new birth of freedom" in the 21st century, in 272 words or less...

**DavidWe**: That's cool - the 272 word limit

MichaelH: that's how many word Lincoln used in the Gettysburg Address...

**ChantaratP**: Michael, I can not continue what you r talking about, due to live so far from the USA, I am in Bangkok

**DavidWe**: Amazing how short the speech is. We really should memorize it.

**DavidWe**: Do you know about the American Civil War, Chantarat?

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, sorry I didn't explain it more... Abraham Lincoln was president of the United States in the middle1800s, during the Civil War in this country

**MichaelH**: He is revered by many as one of the greatest leaders this country ever had

ChantaratP: Yes, a little

**DavidWe** smiles

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, thousands of people go to see his home in Illinois, which is in the center of the United States, every year

**MichaelH**: his speech, the Gettysburg Address, is considered one of the greatest speeches ever made in world history

**MichaelH**: it is very, very short... you can read it at: http://www.law.ou.edu/hist/getty.html

**ChantaratP**: Oh, I just heard about it. In fact, social study, we always study about the history of country and some culture.

**MichaelH**: I see. In the United States, the Civil War was considered a major turning point in our history because it defined the idea that slavery

was wrong, and that black persons were considered as much citizens and equal as anyone else

**DavidWe**: It's amazing how emotional I find that speech. It always makes me shiver when I read it at the Lincoln Memorial

**MichaelH**: It has been very difficult to always obtain that goal, but we are trying

**MichaelH**: Hey, speaking of Civil Rights, I have another resource to share tonight...

**DavidWe** listens

**MichaelH**: Chantarat probably isn't familiar with him, but David, have you ever heard of Jack Johnson?

**DavidWe**: the boxer?

MichaelH: yes

DavidWe nods yes

MichaelH: "the Great White Hope"...

**DavidWe** smiles

**DavidWe** . o O ( James Earl Jones )

MichaelH: yes

**MichaelH**: Johnson will be the subject of a two part feature film which airs next week on PBS... called "Unforgivable Blackness: the Rise and Fall of Jack Johnson"

**DavidWe**: Interesting

**MichaelH**: it's at <a href="http://www.pbs.org/unforgivableblackness">http://www.pbs.org/unforgivableblackness</a>

MichaelH: it is a Ken Burns film

DavidWe: Oh, cool!

DavidWe: You and Ken are so close, now, Michael

SusanR joined the room.

DavidWe waves to Sue

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, Ken Burns is a well-known documentary filmmaker in this country... and is well-known for many movies, especially on Baseball, Jazz music, and the US Civil War

MichaelH: Hi, Sue!

**MichaelH**: do we have a little time to maybe look at a lesson or two?

SusanR: Hi Michael and David.

**MichaelH** is being forced to watch "Highway to Heaven" as he conducts the forum session this evening...

**MichaelH**: this would be a difficult film to introduce in the classroom, to be honest...

**MichaelH**: because of the history of Jack Johnson and his problems with the law

**MichaelH**: that would be hard to explain to a typical social studies class... I would say the students would have to be at least juniors in high school

**ChantaratP**: Thanks Michael for your word, listen your discussion is my favorite.

MichaelH: does anyone know about why Johnson was so controversial

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, I am glad you are enjoying the conversation

**MichaelH**: other than the fact that Johnson was an African-American who was a champion in a sport which was basically reserved for white fighters?

**ChantaratP**: In deed, Michael, it seems like site in the USA university lecture hall

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, we try to be informal... we want everyone to feel welcome and comfortable in sessions here. I'm glad you are able to join us

**MichaelH**: the big problem with Johnson was he also had affairs with white women, and that enraged many.

**MichaelH**: Even the federal government tried to prosecute him (and succeeded ) on various morals charges

**ChantaratP**: Previously, I listen some one mention about the human right, this terms is more obviously in Thailand, and somewhere particularly in Asia, is it right.

**MichaelH**: the lessons don't deal with that, but we couldn't avoid talking about controversy with sports figures

**MichaelH**: Chantarat, in the United States, we unfortunately have a habit of saying we are for human rights in theory, but it is sometimes very difficult for us to put that into practice. David, BJ, Sue, and I can easily point to many instances where groups have been denied equal rights because of their gender, sexual preference, color, and so on

**DavidWe** just gave a printout of the Gettysburg Address to a 6th grader who now knows about the C-Span contest - thanks, Michael.

**MichaelH**: Hey, David, the contest is very, very cool... is the sixth grader interested?

MichaelH: He/she can also enter online

**DavidWe**: Well, he has a copy of the Gettysburg address and he knows about the contest at c-span's web site

**DavidWe**: He is in 6th grade

DavidWe . o O ( we'll see )

## DavidWe grins

**MichaelH**: well, he can enter the contest... I'll be posting the announcement to various listservs either tonight or tomorrow.

DavidWe: Cool

**MichaelH**: I would love to be there for the opening ceremonies for the museum... unfortunately for me, "all expenses paid" to the library wouldn't be much more than a tank of gas...

**MichaelH**: and maybe a 20 oz. bottle of Diet Pepsi to drink on the way

MichaelH: let me share a couple of the lessons before time slips away...

**MichaelH**: Joe Louis was a black fighter who fought against a German boxer in the World War 2 era... when Hitler believed whites were supreme over other races

**MichaelH**: Muhammad Ali gave up the heavyweight boxing title because he believed the Vietnam War was morally wrong, and he refused to go into the Army during the 1960s

**MichaelH**: David, you might tell your favorite sixth grader that there are cash prizes, also in the contest....

MichaelH: here's the other lesson that you might enjoy...

MichaelH: this one talks about how the media treated Jack Johnson...

**MichaelH**: students have to develop period "sports pages" featuring stories about the career of Johnson
